After receiving his law degree Archie practiced litigation in Edmonton as an associate and partner for 15 years. In 1989 he returned to university and obtained a Masters in Law degree from Osgoode Hall Law School. In 1991 he joined the faculty of Murdoch University Law School in Perth, Western Australia where he taught in the Law and Legal Studies programs. He trained as a mediator in Australia and Canada and has mediated for the Citizens Advice Bureau in Perth and for the Mediation and Restorative Justice Centre in Edmonton. After returning to Canada in 2005 he has acted as a Presiding Officer for the City of Edmonton Subdivision and Development Appeal Board and was appointed in 2012 for a three year term as a part time member of the Federal Public Service Staffing Tribunal. He has been on the faculty of Athabasca University since 2008 where he teaches Administrative Law among other subjects.

Archie has been a faculty member of FOAJ for 13 years and teaches the courses Evidence and Interpreting Legislation.
